

- 7. Ancient Rome was a city in the center of what today is the nation of Italy.
- 8. The empire joined them together under one system of law and one government.
- 9. The empire finally got too big to be controlled from Rome. German rulers and their soldiers took over much of the Roman Empire.
- 10. Our modern languages of French, Spanish, and Italian came from Latin. Roman law and government were models for the laws and governments of many countries. Ancient Roman roads and bridges serve as models for builders. Some of the great buildings and many beautiful works of art remain today.
