- 9. Patrick is considered to have established more than 300 churches in Ireland and baptized more than 120,000 people.
- 10. In about 450, Patrick wrote the Confession, an account of his spiritual development.
- 11. According to legend, Patrick drove the snakes out of Ireland.
- 12. Saint Patrick died on March 17, 461, and his feast day is March 17.
- 13. Because of Saint Patrick, the shamrock is the traditional symbol of Ireland.
