ANSWERS

- 1. d. Scotland. According to section "A Monster of a Story in Loch Ness" on page 6, we know that "The lake known as Loch Ness, in Scotland, is big, deep, cold, and dark." So, the correct answer is D.
- **2. b. Plesiosaur.** According to section "A Monster of a Story in Loch Ness" on page 15, we know that "Others think it could be a prehistoric plesiosaur, as shown below." So, the correct answer is B.
